Programme Outcomes

 - order, and decorum, as well as its application to Shakespearean literature.
- **3** Students will analyze William Wordsworth's "Preface to Lyrical Ballads" to understand the key tenets of Romantic literary theory, including the emphasis on emotion, nature, and the imagination, and how these concepts contrast with neo-classical ideas.
- **4** By studying Matthew Arnold's "The Study of Poetry," students will delve into Victorian literary criticism, exploring Arnold's views on the role of poetry in society, the criteria for evaluating poetry, and the importance of literary standards.
- 5 Students will engage with contemporary advancements and discoveries in literary criticism through the 'Innovative Exposure' unit. This flexible unit encourages students to stay updated on current trends and integrate innovative topics into their studies, with guidance from the 'Centre of Innovation' at Madhav University and consultation with their department head for scheduling and topics.

Literature and Philosophy

- Students will explore philosophical questions related to the mind and consciousness, engaging with Woolf's *Mrs Dalloway*, Dick's *Do Androids Dream of Electric Sheep?*, and selected excerpts from Dennett's *Consciousness Explained* to understand how these concepts are represented and challenged in literature.
- Students will gain an understanding of postmodern and deconstructive approaches in literature, analyzing Derrida's essays from *Writing and Difference*, Pynchon's *The Crying of Lot 49*, and Calvino's *If on a winter's night a traveler* to explore how these texts exemplify and critique postmodern philosophy.
